TWENTY FIRST SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

'Who is Jesus?' is a question which Luke seeks to answer in his gospel and in the Acts of the Apostles. To answer this question, he sometimes finds it necessary to correct an inadequate view of Jesus. As in the case of the two disciples on the road to Emmaus who are demoralised about the events surrounding Jesus' crucifixion. It is by returning to Jerusalem, which is also a journey back to the risen Lord, that they begin to have the question answered.

Reflection - The stranger who meets the two disciples on the road to Emmaus journeys with them, talks with them and eventually shares a meal with them. By his closeness to them he transforms failure into fidelity. The assurance of the presence of Jesus with his community today is the inspiration that can equally transform our failures. "Turn your ear, O Lord, and answer me" Newsletter Sunday 25th August 2019

The following is an article written about Prayer by an Irish Augustinian priest, Fr. John Byrne OSA.

I grew up in a world where prayer meant words. Apart from the rosary we had novenas and prayers to favourite saints, devotions of various kinds, indulgences to be gained. The world of prayer was a busy world in which we did much talking. Looking back on it I think that I, for one, had a limited idea of what prayer was about. I was constantly trying to make sure that God was hearing my needs and wishes. It never dawned on me that God might be trying to say something to me, if only I would stay quiet for a while, be silent and listen.

There is a rediscovery in recent years of the value of quiet prayer. You can see this in many recently published books - and it is something whose value I have come to appreciate more and more. It is so simple. We just decide we are going to give the next 20 minutes to God, sit comfortably upright, close your eyes, and give thanks to the presence of God with us.

It is so simple to describe, but it's not always easy to accomplish. We get so distracted and our minds wander away all the time. That's OK. That's what minds do. It is helpful to pick a word that expresses for you your intention to be attentive to God. You can start your period of prayer by repeating this word a few times and then return to it if you yourself getting caught up in distracting thoughts.

Thomas Keating, the Cistercian monk who died last year, said, 'silence is God's favourite language'. One of the fruits of sitting in silence is developing the capacity to live in the present moment. So often our minds are either bothered about things from the past or preoccupied about what is to come, so we are not fully present in this moment. Over time, when we sit in silence, we learn to live in the present. We also get in touch with our own deepest feelings and needs. We discover the truth of what St. Augustine wrote: 'You have made us for yourself, O Lord, and our hearts are restless until they rest in you'.

It may seem that to spend time in silence like that is not *doing* anything and is therefore a waste of time. Yet is it not the 'better part' to sit quietly in the presence of God so as to discover the truth about our inner selves as the beloved children of God? Fr. Michael Carev

Scripture Note

The First Reading presents a vison of all peoples coming to Jerusalem to share in the blessings God has conferred on Israel. This prepares us for the universalist note which we find in the Gospel.

God wills that all people should be saved. People will come from all over the world to share in the messianic kingdom, and the Jews will have no advantage over the Gentiles. Jesus refuses to get into the numbers game, or to speculate about matters that are best left to the wisdom and mercy of God. The main thing is: the kingdom is present and the door open. But the door is not so wide that people can saunter casually in at their own convenience; it is narrow opening through which they must thrust themselves with determination. Besides, the door will not be open indefinitely

The message was originally intended for the Jews, but Luke now intends it as a warning to the disciples of Jesus. There were those who thought they could enter the kingdom simply because they had superficial acquaintance with the master, but who commitment was limited to words. There are those who even did evil, and who still expected to get in. it's a warning against presumption. Salvation depends on the favour of God and the honest struggle to follow his ways. *(Source: Fr. Flor McCarthy, SDB)*
