you imagine a manager of a large business saying to his Board of Directors that he spend a thousand Euro on a party because he had found a few cents that he has lost? In reflecting on the mercy of God we see that it goes way beyond anything we can imagine. It is always superabundant. I said that to someone recently and he told me that he went home and looked up the word in the dictionary because he did not know what it meant. Superabundant is something which is generous in a manner we could never imagine. It is that kindness which surprises us, helps us realise that our offences have been forgiven and then turns us head over heels with joy.

All I could say then to the anxious official of the Secretariat of State was that the logic of Jesus may appear stupid in terms of human calculation, but I have every reason for thanking that stupidity of our God who has the time to think of me with all my limitations, with all my failures with all my stubbornness, with all my self-centredness; the Lord of the Cosmos who has the time to come to my heart and give me encouragement and strength and the hope to keep going in my life and who rejoices when things go well for me.I can only rejoice and marvel that our God is so and I can only respond by trying myself to go and do likewise. We have received mercy and we are called to bring mercy". *Fr. Michael Carey*

Superabundant Mercy

"This man welcomes sinners and eats with them". The Pharisees are scandalised. It is easy to be scandalised by the teaching and the actions of Jesus, because his logic is not our logic.



In reflecting again on the theme of Mercy at the end of the annual Diocesan Pilgrimage to Lourdes, the Archbishop had the following to say:

"Some of you may have heard me tell the story of one of my superiors when I worked in Rome, a saintly Vietnamese Cardinal who had spent more than thirteen years in prison, often in solitary confinement, without ever being charged with any crime. He was finally released and given a passport and an invitation to leave his homeland where he was never allowed to return.

Pope John Paul invited him to give the annual retreat for the Pope and the Cardinals and bishops of the Roman Curia. The Cardinal went away for two weeks and came back with his notes and conferences for the retreat almost complete. One morning I received call from someone in the Secretariat of State in the Vatican asking me to send them the titles of the various lectures the Cardinal had prepared, so that they could finalise the prayer booklet that would be given to each of the participants at the retreat.

Very soon after sending the titles I received an urgent and not quite unexpected telephone call. "What on earth is the Cardinal doing?" I was asked. "One of his talks is entitled: 'Jesus was stupid'. How can we publish such a title?"

I went to the Cardinal and he smiled and told me to tell the Secretariat of State to read the fifteenth Chapter of the Gospel according to Saint Luke – the Gospel we have just heard. He said: "tell them that the story of the woman who lost the drachma was a stupid story for Jesus to be telling. This woman loses a small coin and she sweeps and searches and lights up the entire house until she finds it and then what does he do? She calls in all her neighbours and throws a party which probably cost about a thousand times what the original drachma was worth. Is that not stupid?"

"And what about the shepherd" the Cardinal added, "who loses one sheep and leaves all the others to go and find it? And he leaves the ninety nine we are told "in the wilderness" where they could easily be lost or stolen by other shepherds, just to get one sheep who was probably a difficult sheep who got lost all the time. Is that not stupid?"

I think that you can begin to see now what the Cardinal meant by saying that Jesus told stories which were stupid. Jesus logic is not our logic. His love and mercy go way beyond anything that our human logic would think of or imagine as correct. Jesus' love and mercy go way beyond anything we deserve. Not only does he have a special care for anyone who is lost or who feels of less value than others, but he really rejoices in an extraordinary way when one stray returns to the fold, when one small almost valueless coin is found. The Rosary – A Living Tradition

The month of October is the Month of Our Lady (along with May) but October is in particular the month of the Rosary due to the feast day of Our Lady of the Rosary on October 7th.

The rosary has been a living, growing tradition within the Church over many centuries. The practice originated in the Middle Ages, with the recitation, 150 times, of the first part of what later became the Hail Mary. This was a kind of 'Psalter of Mary', mirroring the use of the 150 psalms in the Liturgy of the Hours. The medieval practice of reciting the Our Father fifteen times in honour of the Passion of Christ seems to have merged with the Marian prayers, one Our Father being attached to each decade. The second half of the Hail Mary gradually developed, and from around the sixteenth century, was generally included as part of the decade. The form of rosary as is best known today was finally established by 1569.
